EASTERN Bay rugby players were among those recognised at the Bay of Plenty Rugby Awards last week.

The awards evening was held at the ASB Stadium lounge last Wednesday.

Waimana's Baden Wardlaw led Rotoiti to the Baywide premier division final this year and was named male club player of the year.

Edgecumbe Rugby Club received the highly commended club team of the year award.

Among the representative awards, Te Teko's William Warbrick was named the Te Waiariki player of the year.

He played in the Te Waiariki Tane side that won the Te Hiku o te Ika Northern Region Maori Rugby Tournament two weeks ago.

The team was also awarded the team of the tournament trophy. Te Waiariki beat Te Raki Paewhenua, North Harbour, 42-15 in the final.
